A Message From CFBOC Leadership

Dear Supporters,

At the Chesterfield Food Bank Outreach Center (CFBOC), 2024 has been a year of meaningful progress and expanded impact—made possible by your unwavering generosity and commitment to our shared mission.

Thanks to the incredible support of the Junior Federated Women's Club of Chester (JFWCC), we proudly opened our new Resource Room. This welcoming space allows us to walk more closely with our clients, listening to their stories and guiding them to resources that go far beyond food—resources that offer real pathways to stability and hope.

We also launched and rapidly expanded our School Pantry Program, which now serves over a dozen schools across our region. These in-school pantries are stocked with food and essential items to ensure that no child has to face the school day hungry or without basic hygiene needs. Every shelf stocked is a step toward dignity and opportunity for the next generation.

Our Senior Distribution Program was further enhanced this year through Chesterfield Community Enhancement to include additional care items specifically tailored for seniors living on fixed incomes. By providing access to these essentials, we help lighten the burden many older adults carry silently—ensuring they know they are not forgotten.

In a powerful show of community collaboration, several local Rotary Clubs came together to purchase a brand-new 12-passenger van. This vital addition helps us expand our Motel Outreach Program, which serves over 300 meals each week to individuals and families living in extended-stay motels along Route 1. Their kindness is already opening new doors—literally and figuratively. None of this would be possible without the compassion and commitment of our volunteers, donors, and dedicated staff. You are the hands and hearts behind every box packed, every prayer spoken, and every connection made.

As we look ahead to 2025, we're filled with both gratitude and anticipation. This coming year marks CFBOC's 15th anniversary, and with it comes renewed passion for the work ahead. We are preparing to expand our Home-Delivery Program, ensuring more of our homebound neighbors receive nutritious food and essential support. We're also excited to launch a pilot Mobile-Pantry Program, designed to bring fresh produce and thoughtful dry goods directly to our most at-risk populations.

Additionally, ongoing renovations and facility expansions will help us better serve our community as our programs—and the needs around us—continue to grow.

With your continued partnership, we remain deeply committed to creating a future where no one in our community goes hungry or unseen. Together, we will keep pressing forward, one neighbor at a time.



The School Pantry Program makes no cost food and personal care items accessible to students at select Chesterfield County Schools. The program requires no registration or proof of need, eliminating roadblocks that could otherwise stop students from getting the help they need to

With its new van, CFBOC is more capable than ever to go where we're needed.

The new CFBOC/Rotary van has already delivered thousands of meals to neighbors in need across Chesterfield County. For those who are homebound, disabled, or otherwise unable to attend an on site distribution, this van is a vital lifeline for them.

Together, we're living out not only the Rotary motto of Service Above Self but also CFBOC's mission of fighting hunger and empowering lives. From motel outreach events to delivering and distributing food and essential goods between our community partners. Our food, and our fleet, is always on the move.

Since its inception, Chesterfield Food Bank Outreach Center has provided over **ONE MILLION** meals to children in the community (2016–2024). This program allows us to provide more year round support than ever before.






Who We Serve
